A Note on the Type

The poems were set on the Linotype in Janson, long thought to be the work of a Dutchman, Anton Janson, who was a practicing type founder in Leipzig during the late half of the seventeenth century. However, it has been conclusively demonstrated

that these types were actually the work of another man, a Hungarian, who learned his trade from another man, a Dutchman, who himself was responsible for training many such men in a basement

and who was born of a woman and man who also had mothers and fathers and birthplaces whose names did not survive

but note how the sturdy faces stand from the page and how important the family has become to us, coming to us through the incomparable design of a tree's white breath
